- Reduced your greenhouse gas emissions by 18% (using an average estimate)
- Reduced your fresh water usage required for food production from 4000 gallons to 300 gallons.
- Used 70% as much pesticides and 8% as much fertilizer.
- Withdrew your participation in the yearly US slaughter of 300,000 whales, dolphins and porpoises, 600,000 goats, 2 million sheep, 29 million cows, 31 million ducks, 121 million pigs, 270 million turkeys, 3.8 billion finned fish, 8 billion chickens, and 43 billion shellfish.
